
## This Year, Easter Means Even More


## A Warm 'Welcome' to Our New Pastor!

Working with our District Superintendent, Dr. Steve Bailey, and our East Ohio Conference Bishop, Dr. Tracy S. Malone, our church's Staff-Parish Relations Committee skillfully laid out our congregation's needs and expectations for our congregation's next shepherd and guide, resulting in the selection and appointment of Rev.

Everett.

Rev. Everett and his wife, Angelique, come to us from Wesley United Methodist Church in Lexington, KY, where he has also led a multicultural movement focused on spiritual and personal transformation and social justice. His additional experience

# ‘First Church’ Has New Owner

Once the home of the congregation known as First United Methodist Church, Cleveland, the grand cathedral located on the corner of East 30th Street and Euclid Avenue sold at auction, February 22, to Cleveland restaurateur Tony George with a bid of \$445,000.

Since its completion in 1905, this towering edifice has often had to survive some tumultuous times in the inner city but over its lifetime has steadily served as a beacon of hope and a source of spiritual sustenance. And with its new owner at the helm, this iconic structure will offer nourishment of a different kind as Mr. George transforms it into an impressive banquet and reception center.

In an interview with Cleveland’s TV-5, Mr. George confirmed, “We’re leaving all of the stained-glass windows in place, we’re leaving all of the walls in place. We’re just going to level the floor...and make it a banquet facility.”

Placed on the National Register of Historic Places in 1995, this Cleveland landmark heard the sounds of nearly 5,000 organ pipes and the voices of countless worshippers for over a century, until January, 2010, when First Church merged with Epworth-Euclid to create our present University Circle United Methodist Church. After their vote to relocate the congregation, First Church members exchanged their sadness at having to leave this “warm and beautiful” place of worship for the picturesque and promising Epworth-Euclid location.

And, with his signing of agreement papers in February, Mr. George shared his vision to have voices and music resound once more throughout the First Church sanctuary:

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“This is a jewel,” he said. “I think this is one of the most iconic, historic, beautiful buildings in Cleveland. I didn’t want it to go to a developer that was going to tear it down. My family is committed to Cleveland, and we always have been.... I think this is the jewel of Cleveland, and we’re going to take tender loving care of it.”

As a combined family of faith, perhaps we can all look at this new chapter in the life of First Church as yet another way God is at work in our lives—a renewal of spirit and an exciting restoration of the love, joy and enthusiasm for living that once filled that space. It may be different, but it’ll be good.

GCC has provided this information:

"At our Delegate Assembly, Tuesday, April 24, you will be asked to consider holding an action [promoting a specific policy ask or focus] with County Prosecutor Michael O'Malley, Administrative and Presiding Judge John Russo, and other key Cuyahoga County criminal justice leaders.

"Though we have recently launched GCC's 'Strengthening Our Power' base-building campaign, which will be a major focus of our energy over the next 18 months, there are important issues we must follow through on, particularly our work around establishing new Mental Health Crisis Centers and increasing opportunities for treatment and support over incarceration.

"Please note: at this action we anticipate having major announcements on both fronts. It will be an opportunity to celebrate and begin to chart the way forward towards greater change."

- As dancers, the Lenten season reaches into the depths of our being and inspires us to delve deeply into our core and physically import that passion into the movement we create?
- Liturgical dance tells a story and even enhances the passion of the story told in music, upon which the choreography is based?
- During Lenten services, we use movement that engages both the dancer and the congregation in a solemn reactive experience?
- As we move into "Holy Week," our choreography follows Jesus' story with movements from the core, representing low, medium and high dance elements?
- The colors change from Lenten pensive purple to contemplative black for Good Friday to snow white as we experience the joy of Easter in celebration and affirmation that "Christ is risen indeed"?! (This is not a question.☺)
- The best liturgical dance experience is one in which the dancer feels and exhibits passion while delivering a movement through his/her body, so that the audience not only views the dance with their eyes but feels the passion of the story in their hearts?

Rev. Everett received his Master of Divinity degree from Southern Methodist University's Perkins School of Theology and expects to receive his Doctor of Ministry degree from United Theological Seminary in Dayton, Ohio, in 2019.

Everett enjoys traveling and has traveled throughout North America, Central America, the Caribbean and to 35 of the 50 United States, not to mention numerous countries around the world. His wife, Dr. Angelique Clay Everett, is an internationally acclaimed soprano soloist for the American Spiritual Ensemble and Associate Professor of Voice at the University of Kentucky School of Music.

The Willson staff, including Principal Dawn Hayden and Assistant Principal Sarah DeGrandis, expressed great appreciation and excitement that we would accept their invitation to read to the kids. Many were helpful in planning the event, with some, under the direction of Mr. Nunnari, art teacher, staying late on a Thursday to turn the lobby into a Seuss-filled entry way that surprised students as they walked in the next morning.

connection for the staff and for pastoral emergencies, funerals, weddings and any day-to-day issues. Dr. Selby will continue her work with the Waze-n-Means Task Force and the Marketing Committee and provide backup for pastoral care emergencies. Dr. Withrow’s coordination of the Transition Team includes working with the dynamics of change in our congregation that can affect leadership, policy, procedure and the ups-and-downs of dealing with the future of a church.

Asked to share their reaction to our family of faith, all three joined to share their response:

“As we stand before the congregation each week in worship, we think, ‘This

church is what church is meant to be!’ We see a congregation that embodies biblical values expressed in worship and welcome for all people. While there are significant challenges before this congregation, we see tremendous opportunity for Church in the Circle to be a vital and engaged witness to the Gospel in University Circle and beyond. We also see this church, with some courage and a lot of work, as having leadership potential for the Midwest in its approach to ministry.

“We are grateful for the people who have thanked us for the perspectives we bring in the transition period; we have met some deeply committed, hospitable saints in the congregation of UCUMC. We also are grateful to work in a Team of Three with

different, mutually compatible levels of expertise. What a gift!”

We as a congregation are exceedingly fortunate and thankful to have these three caring spirits in our midst as we prepare for the next leg of our journey to expand the mission of this church. We are also appreciative of the wise and ingenious direction provided by our North Coast District Superintendent, Rev. Dr. Steve Bailey, and our East Ohio Conference Bishop, Dr. Tracy Malone—direction without which we may not have enjoyed such a multifaceted approach to the healing and the moving-ahead we have experienced. It’s apparent that God’s hand is moving among us, for which we are eternally grateful.


