On Ash Wednesday in Cleveland this year, there were warnings of an impending winter storm. Heavy snowfall was expected to begin coming in off the lake at 7pm. The quick accumulations expected across the region would make the evening rush hour, already compromised by the previous day of snowfall and people leaving early for home, particularly dangerous. Regardless, people were being warned in clear terms to be prepared, get home and shelter in place.

“Great. There go the plans for our two Ash Wednesday services. No setting any attendance records *this year*,” I thought. “Sure is a particular inconvenience when Lent and Easter come early.”

I caught myself sounding like a pastor of a church! I caught myself sounding like some ordained writer and conductor of worship services. I caught myself sounding like some church pastor responsible for ritual observances and evaluating his merit on the basis of increased hoped-for market share.

## A New Way Forward

On January 26, in a very unselfish, caring decision, pastor Dr. Ken Chalker proposed to the Staff-Parish Relations Committee a plan to help reduce the church’s staffing budget by actually retiring on June 30, 2016, and then being reappointed by the bishop to University Circle United Methodist Church (UCUMC) as a retired pastor in *full-time ministry*, effective

GCC presented three specific demands for criminal justice reform, and the candidates pledged to respond to these in writing by March 1.

Our congregation was very well represented at this event, and those who attended were excited to experience the energy and commitment that people of faith bring to the movement for social justice in our community. July 1, 2016. In this way, he would seamlessly continue his current day-to-day ministry but not be compensated through the church's budget.

This plan would reduce staffing expenses by over \$64,000 from July 1 to December 31 as Dr. Chalker's salary, health insurance and pension contributions are removed from the budget. In his full-time retired appointment position, Dr. Chalker would use his pension benefits for living expenses, from July 1, 2016, through June 30, 2017. His appointment would be treated like every other paid or retired appointment, in that it would be reviewed each year for continuation into the next appointment year.

Dr. Chalker spoke with and received the blessing of the East Ohio Conference Bishop, John L. Hopkins, and North Coast District Superintendent, Rev. Dr. Steven Bailey, clearing the way for him to present the proposal to the Staff-Parish Relations Committee, who unanimously approved it at the January meeting.

In a combined meeting on January 31, SPRC presented the approved plan to members of the Finance Committee and the Board of Trustees, who gave the plan their unanimous support. Dr. Chalker, with the assistance of Rev. Dr. Steven Bailey and Jan Kimball, chair of SPRC, then presented the plan for his retirement and reappointment as a full-time retired minister to the congregation after worship on February 7. Dr. Chalker's presentation and rationale were warmly supported and appreciated by those in attendance.

As perspective for Dr. Chalker's decision, within the last two years, our Trustees approved funds to make extensive repairs on the stonework and supporting structure. These repairs were critical to restore the soundness and integrity of the building. However, those expenditures depleted the last of the unrestricted monies in our endowment. As a result, we no longer have interest income for fiscal year 2016 to supplement our pledge dollars towards balancing the monies needed for our operating budget.

Relatedly, even though our pledged dollar amounts for the 2016 campaign came in at a record high amount, we will lack about \$97,000 needed to balance the projected expenses.

These factors played a significant role in Dr. Chalker's decision to investigate the retirement/reappointment scenario for viability and then, when confirmed, present it to the congregation for consideration and ultimate approval.

By freeing up his salary and related items in the church's staffing budget, Dr. Chalker graciously enables our congregation to chart a new way forward—to begin to implement the Strategic Plan as a way to grow and develop our ministry as an urban, welcoming fellowship of believers. It's not only a unique approach to enabling the urban church to survive but a way to let our Church in the Circle refocus on the future—indeed, an unselfish, caring, unique way forward. Be thankful you're a part of it.

### First-Sunday Potluck ~ March 6

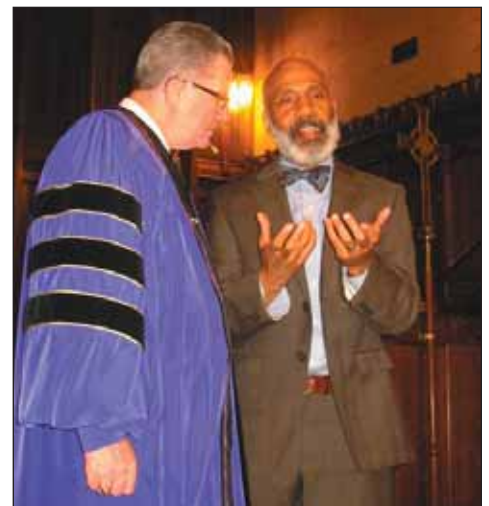

Sometimes during worship, our minds and hearts wander to a loved one or friend, and we wonder how they are doing. Maybe they are experiencing a rough patch and could use prayer. Maybe there’s been a fresh blessing in their lives—maybe a new job or home, or even a new baby—and we feel like sharing the news.

Lavender-colored pew cards can help you make a prayer request. Simply fill in the information (you can be anonymous) and place the card in the offering plate, or drop it into the wooden box at the rear of the Sanctuary as you leave. Prayer requests are shared confidentially with dedicated prayer partners. Just one more way we can love one another as we follow in the Way of the Christ.

## Focus on Education: Our Children’s Safety

Ever since joining the church’s staff as Director of Education, Dr. Amy Wheatley has instituted measures that have safeguarded the children who participate in the life of our Sunday School and any other youth activity in our church. It has always been a first-priority.

With time comes the need to refine the rules around our children’s safety, especially as more and special-needs children enter the classroom on any given Sunday morning. . . or at any other time, for that matter.

Recently, Amy has introduced a set of new guidelines designed to further ensure the well-being of any child who participates in the life of this church. Excerpted portions of these directives are presented, to the right.

While the full version of this updated policy is available in the church office, the excerpts included here offer verification that safety will be a focus with each Sunday School session and any ventures beyond church grounds.

Child safety has few rivals. And that’s why Amy and others have created these safeguards. Be proud of this spotlight on child safety as a priority in your church. It speaks highly of the kind of loving church we have been, are, and will continue to be. After all, a loving, caring Jesus said, “Let the children come unto me and do not hinder them, for the kingdom of heaven belongs to such as these.” No better directive for keeping them safe.

In covenant with all United Methodist congregations, we adopt this policy for the prevention of child abuse in our church. The purpose of the Child Protection Policy of University Circle United Methodist Church is to:

1. Provide procedures specifically designed to protect children, youth, church staff and volunteers associated with the ministries of the church.
2. Establish appropriate ways of responding to alleged, reported, or suspected incidents of abuse.
3. Be in a compassionate ministry with all affected persons—the alleged victim, the alleged victim’s family, the accused, the accused’s family, and the church family.

The procedures outlined in this policy are intended to:

1. Safeguard the children/youth of our church from abuse and neglect.
2. Respond to all allegations in a fair and compassionate manner.
3. Protect church staff and volunteers from potential false allegations of abuse.
4. Limit the extent of our church’s legal risk and liability.
5. Strengthen our children/youth ministries.

In an effort to create a safe environment within our church, persons being considered to work with children/youth in church programs, either regularly or occasionally, on or beyond the church grounds, will be screened.

In an effort to create a safe environment within our church, each church staff person and volunteer who works with children/youth, either regularly or occasionally, on or beyond the church grounds, will be trained on child protection issues. The church will provide regularly scheduled training focused on issues of child protection for those working with children and youth. Attendance at this training or a district or conference sponsored training session will be required of all adults and youth helpers who will have direct contact with children or youth in the church’s ministry.

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The numbers, after all, are the evidence of “success.”

Sounding like a pastor of a church, I continued with my “stinkin’ thinkin’”: “I do not like it when Lent and Easter are early. The likely chance of decreased market share over the previous April will show up in decreased revenue from offerings. The Finance Committee will not be impressed. Cuts will be in the air.”

I really dislike myself when I sound like a pastor of a church whining over budgets and the things that affect them negatively. I really dislike myself when I sound like a pastor of a church in Cleveland, Ohio, thinking about how much “easier” it would be, when Lent and Easter come early, if I served a church in Florida.

I have learned that the minute I catch myself sounding like a pastor of a church focused on the administration and budget—revenue and expense—and overall church business stuff, it is high time that I head for confession. Such times of confession are difficult, often protracted sessions.

To be sure, while church management stuff is important, when one’s spirit becomes out of alignment by being “upset” that Lent and Easter are early and negatively impacting the budget, confession and getting right with the Lord is more than in order.

Here is the deal: Lent and Easter *cannot* be early enough!

Problems, disappointments, challenges and a host of real-life things that surround us are always right on time. A trust in the transforming power of spiritual preparation and a hope of having life and having it abundantly can *never* be too early!

When a loved one is in the hospital and the diagnosis is grim, Easter can never be too early. When pain is chronic, Easter cannot be too early. When a job is lost and a family’s needs are everywhere to be found, Easter can never be too early.

When snowstorms coming in off the open waters of life are dumping “lake effect” in our paths and we cannot shovel fast enough, Easter cannot be too early. When candidates for high office fight over who is really Christian and call each other a “liar,” Easter cannot come too early. When the recurring struggles of making a way in the midst of those whose behavior makes it even harder to make a way, Easter cannot come too early.

A local judge, after imposing a five-year prison term on yet another person convicted of promoting and using child pornography on the computer, was reported as making the comment, “The Internet is the very best thing and the very worst thing that has happened to us. (In such instances as this man), it has made criminals out of cowards.” Easter cannot come too early.

The very best thing that ever happened to us has not been the Internet. The best thing is that God breathed into each of us a living soul. We bear the gift of that Godly breath mark. It is our individual spiritual router connecting us to the universe-wide Internet of the Kingdom of God.

Because so many still do not believe this great truth of our creation, humanity still lashes out at each other—still places people on crosses. Because so many snowstorms of hatred pile up and slow us down, because all of these things and so many more are always taking place in real time in each minute of life, Easter just *cannot* come too early.

With this great truth particularly evident this year, let’s try not to sound like some pastor of a local church. Rather, let’s understand that we are “citizens of heaven,” anticipating and expecting a savior who comes from there. (Philippians 3:20)

*Indeed, Easter cannot come too early.*

## More Than Food for Thought

As you may know, the Outreach Committee leads a variety of donation-based and active volunteer opportunities throughout the year. Several are focused on a specific season or are a one-time event, but other missions continue year 'round. One of the newest and most critical opportunities with which Outreach is involved is the weekly canned food collection for the **Cory UMC Food Pantry**. We are excited about this mission for a number of reasons:



1. It is a critical need. Hunger and nutrition are significant issues in our community, so each can of food we supply represents a meal for at least one Cleveland-area resident in need of assistance.
2. The Cory UMC pantry is local. Cory UMC is less than two miles north of UCUMC on East 105th Street, serving our neighbors.
3. It's easy for everyone to participate in this mission. Just pick up an extra can or box each week at the grocery store, and bring it to church with you. Drop it in the blue bin in the Narthex, and that's it! You have contributed to the dozens of food items our congregation provides to Cory each week.

What's particularly exciting about our church's involvement is that the idea arose, not from a member of our committee, but from a member of the church who saw a need, took initiative and made the mission happen. Passionate about hunger mission work, Sally Harper approached the Outreach Committee a little over a year ago with the idea for starting an ongoing canned food collection drive at UCUMC. She spearheaded the work of finding a food pantry to accept our donations and organizing a group of volunteers to transport the food from UCUMC to Cory. This met with the committee's overwhelming support, and Sally has been running with this mission ever since. In Sally's words...

*"I have been passionate about fighting hunger since I worked as an elementary school librarian and found out from the lunch ladies that many children ate Monday's breakfast as if they hadn't eaten all weekend. Since then, I've supported food cupboards, dining centers and other hunger venues. Even as I began*

*travelling with my 17-foot Airstream trailer in 2010, I attended United Methodist churches all across the country and found that almost all of them collected food for the hungry. So I began to bring food with me, even though I was usually at a different church every week.*

"When I joined UCUMC, I was surprised we were not collecting food, and I didn't know how to get this going. That's when Judy Sockman directed me to Outreach. It was Mary Soirefman who recommended that we keep it in the neighborhood. So, I contacted Cory's Hunger Center, met with them to set up deliveries, and now have a very fine crew of drivers from our church." (Edited)

We are so thankful to Sally and her team of volunteers for their efforts, and say "thank you" to everyone who continues to fill the blue bin with food donations each week!
