~Rev. Jared Gadoski Littleton and GCC releases Greater Cleveland Congregations is **making a difference on issues that matter**. One of them is the "Get Out the Vote" campaign (GOTV), which your delegation from University Circle UMC and other member congregations joined together this past August 25 to unanimously support.



Starting September 17, members of GCC congregations will begin canvassing on Saturdays and Sundays with the goal of knocking on 12,000 doors by election day. GCC already has commitments from an initial 260 volunteers to canvass specific neighborhoods, with a focus on listening to residents about what is important to them, identifying potential leaders and building our GCC base.

University Circle UMC has been particularly lifted up as being one of two partner congregations located near the Glenville neighborhood.

It is in the voting booth that so many justice issues are decided. And all too often, individuals most affected by injustice give up on the system and do not cast a ballot, empowering those with selfish motives to take advantage of the most vulnerable.

Each canvass will begin with substantial training, equipping each volunteer with the tools and confidence they need to go door-knocking. The [Leadership Lab](#) from LA is sending five organizers to Cleveland to help lead this campaign and canvass with us as we build connections and bring about positive change in the community.

There is instead always a fullness of time and new occasions which hold out the promise that so much of life is unrevealed until its season, and our seasons are always, and will always be, changing. So, bring on the fall...and the winter...and another spring.

I embrace that hope with the youthful passion of a child of God.

Custodial Duties Assumed by Solon Janitorial

With budgetary concerns at the forefront, the church's Staff-Parish Relations Committee (SPRC), which deals with personnel issues and is chaired by Jan Kimball, took steps this past June to eliminate the position of Property Manager, resulting in the departure of Chuck Huene.

Karl Clark, formerly on the church's Care Team, is now an employee of Solon Janitorial Services, Inc., which had been interviewed by SPRC and contractually hired to assume custodial and event set-up responsibilities under the direction of Donyah Perine, our Executive Director. Karl's workday is usually spent in our church. His brother, Desmond Clark, remains a church employee, working with Solon Janitorial as needed and tending to other facility needs.

UCUMC member Keith Hamilton, who is with Solon Janitorial, works with Donyah to make certain each day's work schedule is completed. He has also volunteered his time to identify needs and make code-related improvements to the facility.

The needs of the former First Church facility will be addressed as schedules allow.

She showed up first on a Monday afternoon, just hanging out in our beautiful sanctuary. She was drawn by the welcoming messages on our sign, taken in by the glorious architecture we might sometimes take for granted. We talked architecture. She asked questions; I made up answers; we both laughed. The next day, I got a note: *Thanks for the architecture "lesson"!*

A few weeks later, there was a phone call. *Could we meet? I'd really like to talk.* More time in that same pew, more questions—serious ones this time. A troubled young woman wondering if she was even on God's radar any more. A few tears, a hug...and she disappeared.

On a whim, I sent her an email. *Just checking in.* Her response was quick and troubling. The darkness was heavy, she said, and she just wasn't sure she wanted to live. She was in the ER; all was definitely not well. From there, a few days in a mental health setting; her silence was deafening. I prayed. Many of you prayed, as well. Then it came—her awe-filling story of encountering God in the darkness.

She asked, over and over again, *God, where, where, WHERE ARE YOU?* And then little things began popping into her mind—little crazy "coincidences" like stopping in to sit in a beautiful sanctuary. And this young woman who felt abandoned began to understand, for the first time, what the true, crazy Love of God can feel like.

You never know where God is going to work. And that, friends, is pastoral ministry at its finest. Thanks be to God.
